NEW COURSE:**FLST 483/583: Dictionaries & Lexicography (3 crs)**

Description:

The emergence of bilingual dictionaries in the 16th century marked the beginning of modern lexicography. This innovation was linked to printing and the renaissance but also to the age of exploration and the beginnings of colonialism. Dictionaries of many of Europe's languages appeared at about the same time as dictionaries of the languages of north Asia, Southeast Asia and the Americas. Today the development of lexicographic methodology and technology remains a global phenomenon. In this course, the history of modern lexicography will be surveyed, with special emphasis on English dictionaries and national and minority languages of Southeast Asia. Print and electronic dictionaries will be discussed, as well as the link of contemporary technology and modern lexicography.
