His work entailed accessioning the large donation of Binder pieces from M.A. Lipschultz, interpreting the work, photographing and condition reporting on the pieces as well as conducting interviews with Douglas Binder.

A Deb Sokolow Sampler: 20 Years of Speculative Drawing

Rotunda Gallery

Snippets of truth jump out at the viewer when reading the early somewhat crudely rendered diaristic work as well as when one studies Sokolow's later more visually elegant architectural renderings. Both exemplify the artist's obsessive dissection and diagramming to clarify the unexplained. With humor and a dose of paranoia, she burrows deeply when researching her topics deconstructing and critically imagining her apocalyptic narratives.

NIU Art Museum Collection Spotlight by Peter Olson: Douglas Binder

In the mid-1980s, a large donation of artwork came to NIU from Chicagoan M.A. Lipschultz. Among these were 61 paintings and drawings by British artist Douglas Binder (b. 1941). Lipschultz had been impressed by Binder and acquired an amount of his work sufficient to fuel exhibitions in Chicago and Minneapolis in the 1970s. At that time, some pieces were acquired for the collections of the Minneapolis Institute of Arts and the Art Institute of Chicago, as well as private collections. The remaining 61 pieces went into storage until they were donated to NIU where they were safely put into storage yet again.

I came upon this cache when I was hired to manage the collection of the NIU Art Museum in 1993. It made an impression on me as well, but at the time, lack of resources prevented me from narrowing my focus to just this (unframed) work and preparing an exhibition of it.

Patiently, these gouache drawings and acrylic paintings waited until 2023, when graduate student John Hosta chose Douglas Binder to be the focus of his capstone research project in art history. The works were re-photographed, measured, condition-reported and interpreted.

Although we remain unsure about the exact personal meaning behind Binder's chosen iconography, many motifs are repeated throughout his work of this period (1968-1972). This repetition both enhances and subverts our attempts at logical interpretation, depending on their context.

Each panel of the triptych has a central protagonist, or "Magic Object" - an effigy or voodoo doll cobbled together with found materials discarded from an industrial landscape and imbued with a childlike sense of magic. We need to engage our imagination and employ dream logic to begin to interpret these surreal paintings. Although this triptych is among Binder's most complex and multicolored works, it is rendered with black outlines and a "paint-by numbers" flatness, suggesting origins in the visual language of comic books. 

The viewer is confronted by what Hosta calls a "psychedelic buffet" or imagery, where "...spectral figures stand looming like sentinels who guard the secrets of another world or who are ready to do combat with those who are ill-prepared to receive and comprehend them."

With the momentum of Hosta's research and documentation, an exhibition is now planned for the spring of 2025 to be titled, "Phantasmagraphica," a reference to both the inventive and unsettling imagery and the bold graphic style with which it is depicted. One panel of the triptych, along with a preparatory gouache drawing, will be included in the small exhibition.
