

## Diversity Bingo

Facilitator: (Hand out the Diversity Bingo Sheet)

You will have 10 minutes to mingle around, introducing yourself to each other. You will try to find someone for whom the statement in each of the squares is true.

If the person you are interacting with has the experience, have them sign their name in the box.

One person is able to put their name in no more than 2 boxes.

Facilitator: (Debriefing)

Now I am going to ask questions and you can share the information you learned.

- What did you learn about this group, yourself, or another participant through this activity?
- Which squares were easy to fill and which were more difficult to fill?
- What were your expectations about filling the board? Did the activity match those activities?

**Options:** You can alter the Diversity Leadership Scavenger Hunt by exploring diversity concepts, explaining the terms, and definitions. If a person can define/explain what is in the box, they can put their initials in the box. Same rules apply, one person can only initial up to TWO boxes.

## DIVERSITY LEADERSHIP SCAVENGER HUNT

Go around the room and find other people for whom the statement in the square is true. If you find a person who can agree with the statement, they can put their initials in the box.

1. One person can only initial up to TWO boxes
2. You may initial up to Two of your own boxes.
