FROM THE CHAIR



Having served as Undergraduate Director from 2008-12, it's now my pleasure to serve as chair of our fabulous, award-winning department. I began my duties in July when I was teaching for the third time in our NIU at Oxford Uni-versity program. It was challenging to begin my leadership role via email but Angie Dybas, our Office Manager Extraordinaire, kept me wellinformed. When I returned in early August, we prepared for the fall semester and initiated some new endeavors, including a poetry reading by Burmese poet Ko Ko Thett from the University of Iowa's International Writing program, a "performance" by NIU's Unrehearsed Players of Twelfth Night led by Lara Crowley, more professionalization workshops and talks for our graduate students, including a job talk by our doctoral alumna Professor Josh Adair of Murray State, and a new scholarly book celebration to honor Professor Susan Deskis and Professor Jeffrey Einboden, who published books in the last year. Our aim is to create a greater sense of community among faculty and students, while also continuing to pursue dynamic artistic and intellectual work and excellent teaching.

Despite the challenges associated with statefunding issues, our department continues to excel. Our faculty are as excellent as they have always been; not only are we terrific teachers, we rank in the top 10% in terms of scholarship in comparison to our peer institutions. According to the Graduate Studies Program Prioritization Report, the graduate professorial faculty occupy the 94.6 percentile with 43 books published in the years 2011-2015. During that time, we also published 58 articles, 41 chapters, 85 poems, 60 nonfiction essays, and we edited 15 journals. When we consider the faculty as a whole, including instructors and SPS, we published 63 books, 67 articles, 96 poems and 74 essays, and overall we gave 173 conference presentations. We also earned 18 grants and 38 awards. Obviously, our faculty is a scholarly and artistic model for other departments at NIU and beyond. We definitely contribute to the prestige of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and NIU through our creation of new knowledge and literary art. Such excellence in scholarship helped us overall in Program Prioritization.

Our graduate and undergraduate programs have performed well. We've been re-vamping our graduate literature programs to ensure greater breadth and depth. Our new writing track and our Creative Writing Certificate in the undergraduate program have helped our undergraduate major rebound during an era that overemphasizes STEM at the expense of the Humanities. With that said, we created a new careers page to help students understand what they can do with their English degree. We are planning on creating a professionalization course that will help undergraduate majors better prepare for the job market.

We are grateful to have received three awards that support our programs. Emily Hipchen established the Founder's Prize as a memorial to her husband, Chuck Bowie, who helped establish MCLLM, our graduate student conference. The Founder's Prize will be used to support the conference. Mike and Anne Malone have established a short fiction prize that helps undergraduate students get published in Towers Magazine. The winning student will also receive a handsome monetary award. We have also received notice that Alison and David Maki are creating the Glenn Meeter Award, which will assist instructors, graduate students, and faculty with faculty development.

For now, let me say that we have a great team of administrators and office staff who keep this department running and thriving. I'm grateful to Undergraduate Director Brad Peters, Graduate Director Jessica Reyman, Michael Day, First-Year Composition Director, Judith Pokorny, Assistant to the Undergraduate Director and Coordinator of Teacher Licensure, Angie Dybas, our Office Administrator, Jodi Long, our Undergraduate Office Support Specialist, Maribel Montelongo, our new First-Year Composition Office Support Specialist, and Stephanie Roach, our new Graduate Program Office Support Specialist, who all make my job much easier and who are delightful to work with.

Honors and Awards

Professor Jeffrey Einboden recently learned that he is the recipient of the highly-prestigious American Council of Learned Societies Fellowship. The competition for the award is fierce; ACLS received 1200 applications but only 71 awards were granted. Since 2013, Dr. Einboden has published or contracted five monographs, two of which were contracted by Oxford University Press. His work, which intersects American literary history and Islamic influence, is topical and timely. It has attracted national and international notice, not only within the academy, but also beyond the academy. We are extremely proud of Dr. Einboden's work.

Eric Hoffman, Coordinator of Networked Writing and Research and who works in our First-Year Composition Program, is a recipient of one of this year's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences Awards. According to the college's spokesperson, Eric is one of "11 very special individuals who have made major positive contributions to the college and its reputation for excellence."

Graduate Scholarship Award.







RETIREMENTS

In June of 2016, two of our long-serving faculty members retired, **Professor Phil Eubanks** and **Professor John Schaeffer**.

Dr. Eubanks joined our faculty in 1996 after receiving his Ph.D. at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. He is the author of three scholarly books: Metaphor and Writing: Figurative Thought in the Discourse of Writt n Communication. (Cambridge University Press. 2011), The Troubled Rhetoric and Communication of Climate Change. (Routledge, 2015) and A War of Words in the Discourse of Trade: The Rhetorical Constitution of Metaphor (Carbondale: Southern Illinois University Press, 2000). He is also the author of 18 articles. During his 20 years at NIU, Dr. Eubanks held numerous administrative positions in the department, including chair, acting chair, interim chair, and graduate director, while also serving on department council, UGSC, UCC, graduate studies committee, and undergraduate studies committee. He directed two dissertations and 14 MA theses.

Dr. Schaeffer taught at NIU for 26 years, after receiving his Ph.D. from St. Louis University. The author of two books, Giambatt sta Vico's Universal Law.2 vols. Trans. John D. Schaeffer (Lewiston PA: Edwin Mellen Press, 2011) and Sensus Communis: Vico, Rhetoric, and the Limits of Relativism (Durham NC: Duke University Press, 1990), he also published three book chapters, and 20+ articles. Dr. Schaeffer was also the recipient of two NEH grants and one Fulbright Award. While at NIU, he served as the Director of First Year Composition from 1996-98. He directed four dissertations and also served as the Newberry Library Representative as well as on many other committees, including Graduate Studies, UCC, General Education, and was the Faculty Advisor of the NIU Chess Club.

We thank both Dr. Eubanks and Dr. Schaeffer for their excellent work in our department and we wish them well in their new post-retirement endeavors.
