Major in Special Education (B.S.Ed.)

The B.S. Ed. in Special Education includes two emphases: Learning Behavior Specialist I (LBS I) and Vision Visual Impairments. The LBS I cross-categorical emphasis prepares candidates to obtain an Illinois educator license with entitlement as a Learning Behavior Specialist I (Pre-K - age 21). The emphasis in Vision Visual Impairments prepares candidates to obtain an Illinois educator license with entitlement in the area of Teacher of Students Who Are Blind or Visually Impaired (Pre-K - age 21).

Entrance and Retention in the LBS I and Vision Visual Impairments Program Emphases To advance to the first ... I NIU GPA. All candidates who meet requirements are admitted to the Learning Behavior Specialist I or Vision Visual Impairments teacher education program.

To remain a major in special education, candidates must (a) maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.50 or better, (b) receive a grade of C or better in professional courses and a grade of Satisfactory (S) in clinical courses, and (c) pass the ISBE content area test and Special Education General Curriculum Test before enrolling in student teaching courses. Candidates in the LBS I emphasis take the Learning Behavior Specialist I content test, and candidates in the Vision Visual Impairments emphasis take Teacher of Students Who Are Blind or Visually Impaired content test. For both the LBS I and the Vision Visual Impairments emphases, candidates must pass all required courses in professional semesters with grades of C or better or, as appropriate, with a grade of S, before advancing to the next professional semester. Candidates ... such as TB testing that candidates must complete prior to working with students.

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Transfer Students

Individuals who have earned the Associate of Arts in Teaching (A.A.T.) in Special Education may apply to transfer into teacher education in either the Learning Behavior Specialist I (LBS I) or the Vision Visual Impairments emphasis. Transfer students ... LBS I endorsement.

License and Endorsement Requirements

Candidates who major in special education in the Learning Behavior Specialist I emphasis or the Vision Visual Impairments emphasis are required Candidates who successfully complete the program requirements and pass the state mandated Teacher Performance Assessment (edTPA) during student teaching will have completed all required ISBE and CAEP standards for receiving university recommendation for licensure and special education endorsement in Vision-Visual Impairments or Learning Behavior Specialist I. ... recommendation for licensure.

A student may not count more than 60 semester hours There are exceptions to this regulation in the case of students majoring in Mathematical Sciences with an emphasis in mathematics education or with an emphasis in actuarial science, and in different divisions of the Department of Communication, the Department of Foreign World Languages and Literatures Cultures, and the department of Geographic and Atmospheric Sciences. For example, the 60-semester-hour maximum applies to course work offered for a

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major in French, but does not exclude additional hours in another foreign language in the Department of Foreign World Languages and Literatures Cultures. ENGL 103, ENGL 203, and ENGL 204 are not counted toward the 60-semester-hour maximum hours taken in the major in the Department of English.

Department of Foreign World Languages and Cultures Literatures (FL--)

The Department of Foreign World Languages and Cultures Literatures offers major programs leading to the B.A. degree in World Languages and Cultures with emphases in French, German, and or Spanish. There are two emphases available for each major. Foreign language mMajors may gain licensure to teach at the secondary level in French, German, and/or Spanish.

The department offers a minors in World Languages and Cultures with options in Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Russian, and Spanish, and Translation for Global Literacy. The department also participates in the interdisciplinary minors in classical studies, comparative literature, Latino/Latin American studies, linguistics, Southeast Asian studies, and women's, gender, and sexuality studies, and offers FLCL 3271, Classical Mythology, FLFR 371, Masterpieces of French Literature in Translation, FLIT 272, The Italian Renaissance, and FLRU 361, Russian Culture and Literature for general education in the Knowledge Domain "Creativity and Critical Analysis". FLCL 271 and FLRU 361 are also part of the "Origins and Influences" Pathway. , in the humanities and the arts area of distributive studies. French majors may not take FLFR 371 for general education credit.

Educator Licensure - Foreign World Languages and Cultures

Students majoring in World Languages and Cultures with an emphasis in French and Francophone Studies, German Studies, or Spanish and Hispanic Studies who seek licensure to teach a language in grades K-12 should consult with the Foreign World Languages and Cultures Educator Teacher Licensure office at the earliest possible opportunity. in addition to university general education requirements. opportunity. Teacher Educator licensure involves significant requirements in addition to the completion of a language degree and university general education requirements. *PDF needs to be corrected; several errors in paragraph above.

Procedures

Declare a major in World Languages and Cultures with an emphasis in French and Francophone Studies, German Studies, or Spanish and Hispanic Studies; usually with an emphasis in language and literature. Consult each semester with the major adviser for courses in the specific language major.

Consult with the Foreign Language World Languages and Cultures Teacher Educator Licensure office at the time the major is declared and at the beginning of each semester thereafter.

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A study abroad experience is highly recommended for all students in the foreign language World Languages and Cultures educator licensure program.

Educator licensure students are required to take all the regular courses for a emphasis in French and Francophone Studies, German Studies, or Spanish and Hispanic Studies Emphasis major, in addition to choosing specific culture and linguistics courses as upper-level electives.
